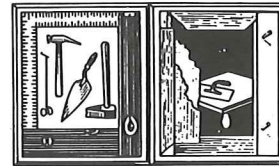

## GERRY JENNIGES

*His work is a definition of quality by those who worked with him*

When Apprenticeship Coordinator Mark Wickstrom wants to explain to a student how to build a reputation for quality work, he starts talking about Gerry Jenniges.



"I tell the apprentices coming up, that's where you want to get to," Wickstrom said. "You want to get to a level where your name is well known for doing good work. If you play your cards right, there isn't a contractor in the Twin Cities who wouldn't hire you. You want your reputation to precede you, but for the right reasons."

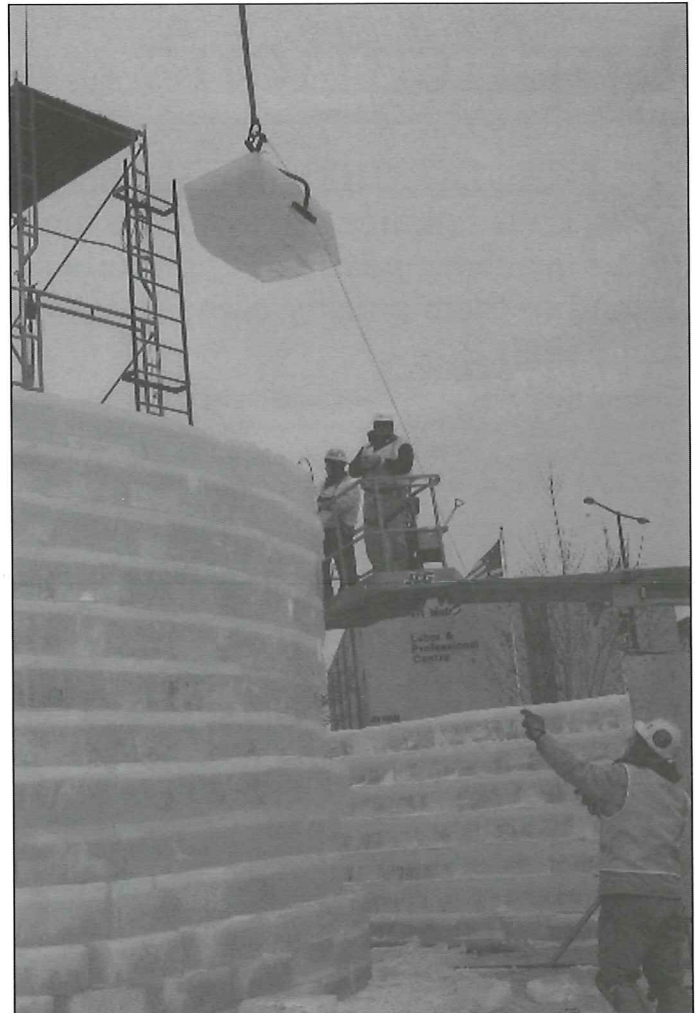
### Jenniges

Jenniges's reputation both preceded him and has lived on after him.

Now 70 and enjoying a comfortable retirement with his wife of 50 years, Leona, Jenniges retired as an apprenticeship teacher in 1993 and as an active bricklayer in 1996. In addition to his full-time work for a series of Twin Cities construction firms, Jenniges had taught apprentices for two evenings a week for 25 years.

Last October, long after the end of his career, Jenniges was called to Washington, D.C., to commemorate an honor that had marked the beginning of his career. In 1958, at the age of 24, Jenniges won a national apprentice contest in bricklaying. The oldest previous winner to be honored at the contest, he is still the only

# Deadlines near for scholarship applications



**S**CHOLARSHIPS for union members and their families are available for the next academic year, but applicants should attend to them quickly because deadlines are looming.

Information on most can be found under the “scholarships” link on the Minnesota AFL-CIO Web site, [www.mnaflcio.org](http://www.mnaflcio.org) <<http://www.mnaflcio.org/>> . One link leads to a national AFL-CIO Web site, where more scholarship opportunities are described.

Available only to high school juniors who are children of BAC members are two Bates Special Merit Scholarships, which will be awarded in 2005 as part of the National Merit Scholarship program. The scholarship,

worth \$2,000 per year for up to four years, will be granted to students who have taken the PSAT test and plan to attend college in Fall 2005. The application deadline is June 15.

Due April 1 are applications for the Bill Peterson Scholarship, which was established in honor of the man who served as Minnesota AFL-CIO secretary-treasurer from 1990-99. The scholarship is available to members of unions that contributed to the Bill Peterson Scholarship Fund in 2003 (BAC Local #1 was a contributor), and their spouses and children. Applicants must have a letter of acceptance from a post-secondary school and must complete an essay on “How the Union has improved my family’s life.”

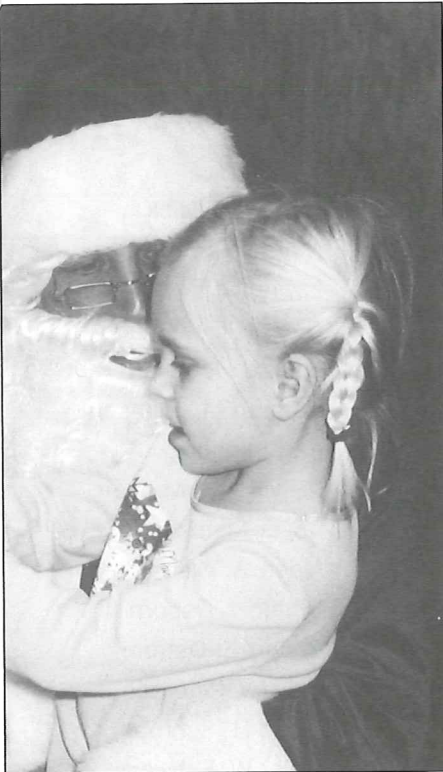
The Minnesota AFL-CIO will award five scholarships in 2004 to graduating high school seniors who are union members or their dependents. The application deadline is May 1. These applicants must have at least a “B” average and must plan to attend a college or technical school located in Minnesota. The Martin Duffy Adult Learner Scholarship Award is awarded to Minnesota union members affiliated with the Minnesota AFL-CIO or Minnesota Teamsters Joint Council 32. All scholarship funds are applicable only to Minnesota education institutions. Applications are available at [www.mnaflcio.org](http://www.mnaflcio.org) <<http://www.mnaflcio.org/>> . The deadline is April 30.

Minnesota AFL-CIO Labor Leadership grants are available to members of affiliated unions seeking to develop their abilities and skills as union leaders. Recipients and amounts awarded will be selected by the Minnesota AFL-CIO Education Committee. There is no set deadline. Applications can be found at the organization Web site.

**Attend your precinct caucus on March 2**

An essential first step in participating in this year's important elections will come March 2, when voting citizens assemble at neighborhood caucuses to recommend issues and candidates.

Campaign issues will be refined and convention delegates selected.

Caucuses will be held at 7 p.m. in locations across Minnesota. To find out where your party's caucuses are being held, check phone numbers or Web sites provided.

Caucus participants introduce and vote on resolutions they believe should be included in their party's platform. This year, resolutions are likely on subjects like prevailing wages, project labor agreements, health care, education, workplace rights and employment benefits. Some parties require that resolutions be submitted on special forms and in multiple copies. Check your party's Web site for specific procedures.

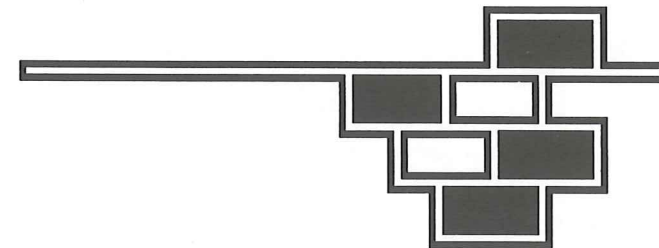

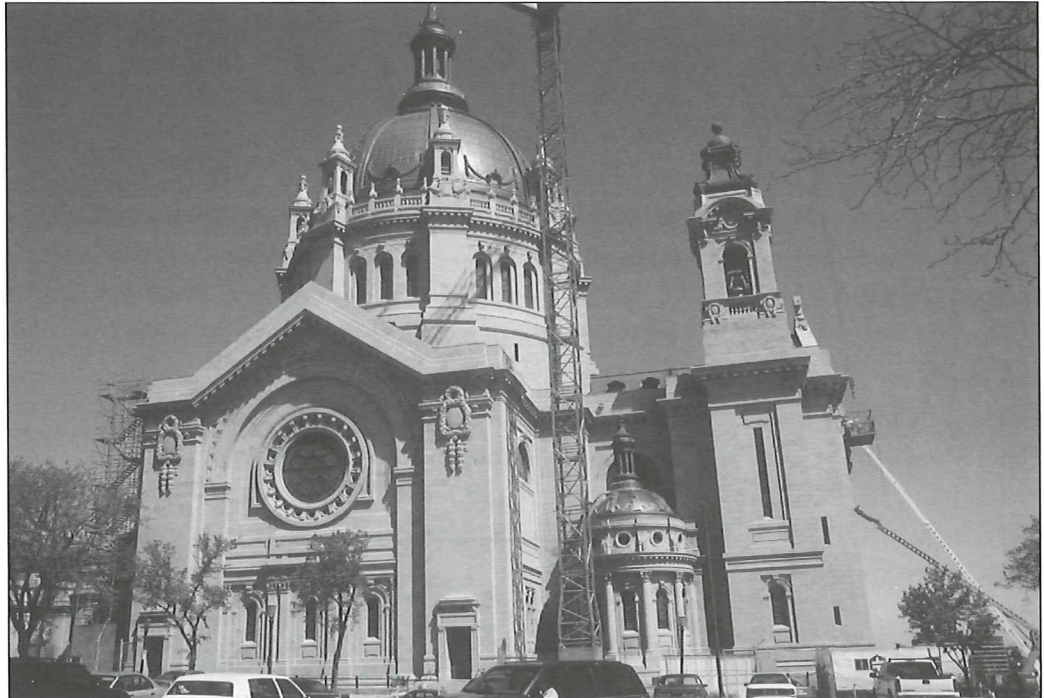
Both the Goodhue County facility and Redstone Grill were recognized in the brick category.

# JENNIGES: A perfectionist at work

Minnesota bricklayer who's won the title of Bricklaying Apprentice Champion.

The BAC/IMI International Apprentice Contest named winners in brick, cement, marble, plaster, stone and tile. Each of the six winners received a Ford F-150 pickup truck. Jenniges and his wife, together with two other past champions, were there Oct. 18, 2003, to see the contest.

Today, Jenniges keeps memorabilia from his early win: a trophy, a gold ring and a picture of himself wearing a crown and a big smile. But he also has a collection of plaques awarded through a long career. Jenniges was stone foreman on two projects that were named best of their years by the International Union of Bricklayers: Gavidae Common, Minneapolis, in 1989, and the Minnesota History Center, St. Paul, in 1992.

He also was stone foreman for construction of the Minnesota Judicial Center, St. Paul; the IDS tower, in Minneapolis; and St. Mary's Hospital, in Rochester, Minn.

Dan Quinlan, now an instructor at the BAC Apprenticeship Training Center in St. Paul, grew up alongside some of Jenniges's seven children.

"He kind of brought me into the trade, then got me into the instructor's position," Quinlan said. "We worked together on the job for probably 15 years. He has big hands, but a real gentle touch with brick and stone. Everything he did was perfect. He laid every brick just perfect. It looked like a picture."

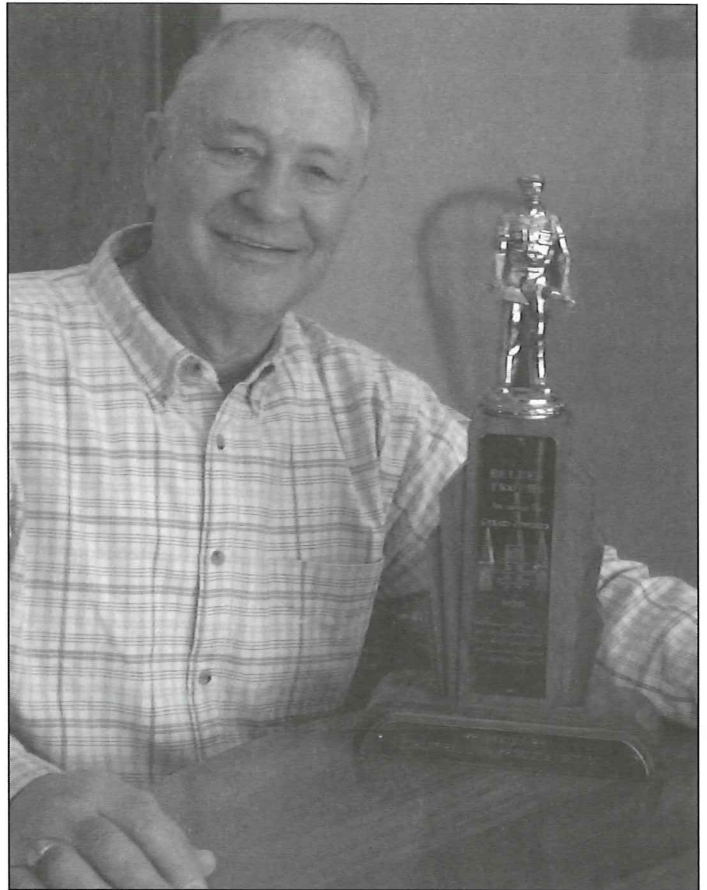
Jenniges bristles at the idea that he's any better than other bricklayers, but admits he's "kind of a perfectionist, I guess, when it comes to my work."

He tried to pass that on to the apprentices he trained.

"When you're an instructor you naturally tell the apprentices to do the work well," he said. "You start out slow. As you progress, you pick up speed. Make sure you get everything level. As time goes by they'll pick up the speed."

Jenniges taught his students, including Wickstrom, that "it's all about attitude, doing the best job you can with what you're handed," Wicksrom said.

"He was a good teacher. I thought he was an excellent bricklayer. It was good to get the tradesman perspective, rather than having an academic teacher — more of a hands-on guy."

Quinlan has a favorite memory of being a very young trainee when, as a kid, he helped the Jenniges family build their home in Mendota Heights. Jenniges put the house up over about a year, with his children helping out and his wife mixing, Quinlan said, every batch of mortar. Gerry and Leona still live there.

None of his children went into the trade, Jenniges said. Instead, each of the seven earned a degree from the University of Minnesota. "Two of the boys worked on construction in the summertime," he said. "It probably had something to do with why they decided to go to college." He and Leona have 11 grandchildren, so far.

Jenniges laid a lot of brick and block, but said his favorite building material was stone. At the much-visited Minnesota History Center, he said, meticulous care was taken in laying the building's combination of limestone, granite and marble.

"We felt we should take care in doing it right," he said.

**T H E 2004 I C E C A S T L E**

**A** very big gift from the construction trades to the people of the Twin Cities was the highlight of this year's Winter Carnival. The first Ice Palace since 1992 was erected in downtown St. Paul opposite Xcel Energy Center

Union volunteers cut ice from Lake Phalen, trimmed blocks to size, lifted them into position with cranes and melted them together with LP torches. A job that started late because of temperatures that were too warm became a long struggle against subzero cold, as 1,302 volunteers assembled a translucent, three-dimensional puzzle of 27,000 pieces.

Central to the construction effort was the work of some 137 members of BAC Local #1, who supervised placement of 400- to 500-pound blocks of ice to a height of 60 feet. Many of the volunteers were apprentices. Apprenticeship Coordinator Mark Wickstrom spent many days at the construction site, using a chainsaw to give the ice blocks a final trim.

Dick Anfang, president of the Minnesota State Building Trades Council had promised that AFL-CIO construction trades would contribute labor to build the Ice Palace. Ultimately, more than 1,300 union volunteers reported to work, coming from across the state.

Union workers were coming from behind, Anfang said. Work on the Ice Palace was scheduled to start Dec. 8, 2003, but on Dec. 8 the temperature was 48 degrees and there was no ice on Lake Phalen.

And they were tackling something new. "We volunteered this year to harvest the ice, where we had not volunteered that in the past," Anfang said. "We had to build our own saws." Carpenters and ironworkers col-

laborated on a design based on old photographs, Anfang said, and the saws were manufactured by Penhall Co., of Golden Valley.

Starting three weeks late, the project later compensated by hiring 14 people to supervise

and speed the work of volunteers. The Ice Palace opened on time Jan. 22, and was toured by an estimated 750,000 people over the next three weeks. After its closing Feb. 8, union volunteers went back to work disassembling the structure.

Anfang said of the outpouring of union support for the Ice Palace project had been "more than we expected."

"It's a challenge, anytime you take on something like this, where you depend on the generosity of people and their own pride and talent. Knowing our history and the pride that members take in their community, we took a gamble, figured we'd win, and we did!"

Union volunteers saved the Winter Carnival big money, especially important after near-bankruptcy in 1992. Contribution of union labor shaved an estimated \$1.9 million off the \$8.4 million cost of building the Ice Palace, Winter Carnival spokeswoman Angela Yender said.

Another \$5 million worth of services and materials were donated by companies that included Collins Electrical; Fratalone, Inc.; Gresser Companies; Kraus-Anderson Construction Co.; Leo Daly Architects; Veit & Co., and Xcel Energy. *(We apologize if your company should be listed and isn't.)*
